Can you move forward and yet stay in the same place? The church can.


Its building can remain at the heart of the community and parish, yet it, and the congregation which gathers in it each week, can change and grow.

We have set a challenge for growth before ourselves. **Internally:** to grow in our financial support for the work we do and share in locally and nationally as part of the Church of Scotland **Externally:** to use the grant we have received from the General Trustees to develop the building in such a way that our vision of what it means to be a parish church in 21st century might be realised.

So it was good to hear at our meeting with Presbytery representatives last month two of our younger members take the lead in explaining how much we do both for the church and the community. It is staggering to think how many of us have some form of direct community involvement beyond church activities – from flower clubs to pastoral support; from community action and housing to cricket clubs and community choirs.

We are living out the truth that the church is not about Sunday or Bible study or events we attend but about how we take the Good News of Jesus and make it real in the lives we live amongst our friends and neighbours whatever faith they do or don't have. We build our faith by our learning and worshipping together, but we share the Gospel by how we put that into practice day by day in the things we choose to do, in how we relate to everyone else we meet. And our new challenges are just our putting into words the development of such faith in action

Christian Aid works with project partners all over the world to support people to help themselves out of poverty. They aim to tackle the root causes of poverty as well as the effects. They support projects and work on issues as varied as income generation, farming cooperatives, HIV, Aids and Malaria community based healthcare, human rights and disaster relief. They also campaign at a government level for policy change on issues such as fair trade and climate change.

Sunday 22^{nd} May saw our annual Christian Aid service to celebrate Christian Aid Week. Having asked members of the congregation to fill collection boxes we raised a fantastic £808.02 this year. Which will also increase after gift aid contributions have been included.

There are around 1billion people across the world surviving on less than \$1 a day. We can't end this cycle of poverty unless we work together. I would like to thank everyone who contributed to our total this year, who encouraged friends and family to do the same and who prayed for the work of Christian Aid. Remember: Christian Aid work for people all year, not just in Christian Aid Week!

Can I also please say a big thank you to all those who helped count after the service and figure out how to bank £800 of coins!

Maundy Thursday Service Mandatum Novum -

from "A new command I give you; Love One Another" – (John 13.34)

"Love One Another" – centuries ago sovereigns enacted the fulfilment of this command by washing the feet of the poor. Nowadays that ceremony has been replaced by the distribution of alms, Maundy Money.

Last month our Maundy Thursday service celebrated the Last Supper, which followed Jesus' washing the disciples' feet.

For a number of weeks the Lenten Study Group had been exploring various facets of prayer, including the use of poetry and art as a way of thinking, about, and into, prayer.

A painting of The Last Supper was projected on to a screen in the chancel throughout the first part of the service. It had earlier inspired the Group to write prayers themselves and to reflect on what the disciples might at that time have been feeling.

Simon the Zealot was one of those scared and angry men gathered around the table, keyed up with excitement about the approaching Passover. They may have had hopes for the start of an uprising. Simon was looking and waiting for an independent Israel. Judas, tormented by self-doubt, wanted Jesus to speak out and free his brothers from the yoke of tyranny, and show the world that Jesus truly was the Messiah.

That painting of The Last Supper focused on Jesus himself and on the bread in his hands and on the cup, as tangible signs of grace, and invited us to do so too.

The command "Love One Another" inspired the Group to compose prayers. One of them, following the Haiku style with lines of 5,7,5,7,7 syllables, was about hunger:

Hunger

As famine takes life We regard complacently Pot-bellied children. Fill us Lord with compassion; Inspire and enable us.

To open the second part of the Maundy Service the Choir gave us "A new commandment... Love one another" and the congregation sang the hymn "Twas on the night..."

The minister called worshippers to "Come to this table to meet the Living God, the Risen Christ." And led the celebration of Holy Communion.


DID YOU HEAR ABOUT THE MINISTER'S DONKEY

Little People who have made a Big Impression The Widow and her Mites

God has always had a soft spot for widows. With aliens and the fatherless they appear time and again in Jewish Law. For example they were to be allowed to glean in the fields and orchards, and should be given an allowance from tithes.

However the Jews did not always obey the commands as generously as they should. The widow Zarephat had just tiny portions of flour and oil, to eat before she died. Years later Luke tells of some Greek widows who were being overlooked in the daily distribution of food.

Both Mark and Luke tell of a widow who put into the temple treasury "two very small copper coins worth only a fraction of a penny." Jesus saw this and told his disciples that she had put in "everything... all she had to live on."

One can imagine her looking at these two coins and choosing between giving them to God and buying a little food for herself.

By the standards of today the widow was only "one of the little people" but her selfless sacrifice made an impression on Jesus, his disciples, and 2,000 later on us.
