# THE GREAT COTTON STITCH-UP

In November 2010 we launched a major policy report, *The Great Cotton Stitch-Up*, which sets out the reasons why millions of cotton farmers are locked in poverty, our recommendations for changing this and how Fairtrade can be part of a more hopeful future for farmers.

The United States and the European Union have lavished an eye-watering \$31.45 billion in subsidies on their cotton farmers since 2001, the report revealed.

The shocking scale of the West's subsidies is one of the biggest reasons why 10 million West African cotton farmers are trapped in poverty. A wall of rich world subsidies effectively squeezes out West African cotton and dampens global prices. For West African countries who rely on cotton as one of their principal exports, it means they do not get the revenue to invest in infrastructure to create a sustainable garment industry.

The report also provides the ballast for an important new Fairtrade campaign demanding the phasing out and elimination of US and EU. The Stitch-Up campaign will accelerate over coming months in what is a vital year for the international trading system.

2011 will see attempts in Brussels to frame a new European Common Agriculture Policy currently costing Euro 55bn. The Stitch-Up report established that Europe pays its cotton farmers more in subsidies per pound than any other nation or trading bloc and is a principal target for Fairtrade campaign activities. The US, which is overall the biggest cotton subsidiser having dished out \$24.45bn to 18,500 farms in nine years, is also framing a new Farm Bill – the mechanism it uses to pay its farmers tens of billions of dollars. In 2011, there will also be renewed efforts to kickstart the stalled Doha Development Round ahead of a tenth anniversary WTO ministerial meeting in November.

The Great Cotton Stitch-Up contrasted how one farm in the US scooped \$24.3m in subsidies during the past 14 years with Moussa Doumbia, a Mali cotton farmer who earns a paltry \$322 a year from his cotton farm. Moussa, who along with his two youngest children nas malaria, relies on his cotton crop to reed his family. In Mali, 77% of people live on less than \$2 a day, just 43% of children go to school and life expectancy is 48.

In the 8,000-strong Mobiom Fairtrade co-op in southern Mali, 95% of eligible farmers' children go to school and Fairtrade premiums have been invested by the community to build a maternity unit and pay the wages of a mid-wife as well as many other projects to improve farmers' businesses.

Ten years ago, in September 2001, I went to Papua New Guinea. The Guild had then as one of its projects the work of Mission Aviation Fellowship there so, together with Fiona Punton, the Information Officer, and Janette Henderson, Convener of the Projects Committee, I spent a fortnight flying in small planes learning what that work was.

We found a third world country with few roads, steep forested mountain ranges, villages with none of what would consider we basic essentials and а population only a couple of generations removed from head-hunting and cannibalism where interviolence frequently tribal erupted.

We also found lives being saved by medical

evacuations, churches being to function through able subsidised flights for their personnel and the economy of villages being greatly helped by transport of their coffee crops. This was done bv people who gave up comfortable lives in their home countries to follow Christ and his command to love God and their neighbour as themselves.

This was a very humbling experience. We who take for granted electricity, running water, shops with a great variety of food, the close proximity of medical help and easy travel, were so by impressed the commitment of the pilots, the engineers, the other missionaries we met who had given up most of these faced basics and who difficulties and at times danger.

returnina to Australia On before flying home, Fiona and Janette walked across the top Sydney Harbour Bridge. (I took the photographs!) Τo 10<sup>th</sup> commemorate the anniversary of this lifeenhancing trip, we will be walking across more bridges, the three of us this time. These will be the Forth, the Tay, the Skye and the Erskine bridges.

This will take place during the weekend of 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> September.

# **Religious Leaders meet in Helmand**

Religious Leaders from different faiths have come together in Central Helmand, Afghanistan to learn more about each other.

Operating in the Nad-e Ali (South) area of Helmand are Afghan Army and Police, Royal Marines from 45 Commando and Gurkhas from the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion the Royal Gurkha Rifles.

When the local elders heard that the Gurkhas' religious advisers were planning а visit, they organised a shura (meeting) for the representatives of the different religions to come discuss together and the similarities shared by their faiths.

Seated on a carpet, drinking chai (Afghan tea) was an Islamic Mullah, a Hindu Pandit, a Buddhist Lama and a Christian Padre-the Church of Scotland's Rev Dr Scott Shackleton, who is chaplain to 45 Commando Royal marines.

The senior Mullah for the area, Mullah Ahdin led the shura which involved a wide and fascinating ranging discussion of various topics from the funding of religious activities to farming skill in their respective countries and from politics to schooling even dietary and habits. Mullah Ahdin was particulary interested to learn about the UK's multi-faith society, and that soldiers from all faiths are eligible to and do, join the Armed Forces.

Dr Shackleton said: "this special meeting can only help deepening in our understanding of people of different faiths and cultures and thus forging a common purpose for the good of all humanity. We have been blessed indeed in being given this opportunity to meet these special people in this unique setting"
