They heard about the plaques God sent, and how God was able to do amazing things even opening up the sea to allow the people to safely cross. The culmination on the Friday was the fur the children had playing on the bouncy castle, and as in other years, when 12.00 came on the Friday everyone was sad to

see the end of the holiday club for another year. However, we hope to be able to organise an event nearer to Christmas as we did last year so that we can have some festive fun together. I would like to say a huge thank you to all the team for their excellent input again this year. They really do work very hard at planning every detail of the week and it shows in the way the club runs so smoothly. A special thanks to our young helpers for giving up their time. We remembered a congregation big enough to warrant 2 or even 3 services every Sunday.

There was a big Sunday School. As well as the Primary and Beginners departments we had four Intermediate classes. Our BB Company had a Bible Class meeting every Sunday. Three House Groups regularly met midweek for Bible Study. We had Congregational outings. There were DIY concerts, Anne Earnshaw's 'Strings and Things' and the 'Come Together' group.

There was a lot going on in those days.

Is all this just nostalgia, or is there a feeling of 'Ichabod' (*the Glory has Departed*)? We are clearly just a shadow of our former selves?

So should we mourn, moan or mope and give up hope?

NO! NO! NO!

The money raised will help to support the Girls' Hostel at the St Colmuba's Religious Training Centre, Sialkot, Pakistan.

The money raised during 2011 Stamp Appeal will to help support a Place of Hope "Mount Olivet Boys' Home" Jamaica.

Through the Mount Olivet Boys' Home, the United Church in Jamaica and Cayman Islands and the Government of Jamaica provide a place of hope for young boys who have been abused or neglected. Established in 1973 with the conversion of a Presbyterian manse, the home now looks after around 30 boys with an average age of 12.

The Mount Olivet Boys' Home is committed to

- Preparing the boys for post-institutional life
- Strengthening medical care including psychiatric and emotional support
- Providing comfortable living conditions
- Facilitating academic and vocational development
- Offering spiritual nurture and assistance with personal development
- Staff training facilitating recreation and positive socialisation

Needs and Development

To advance this agenda, much work is needed

including:

- Refurbishing buildings following structural damage after successive hurricanes
- Improving the laundry area to conform to health and safety requirements and upgrade the staff area
- Reconfiguring of the water system to make it more efficient
- Installing solar equipment to harness natural resource and reduce utility bills

The amount raised, so far, this year up to 13^{th} July 2011 is £1,209.00.
