Church House Development

I feel like asking the editor simply to reprint the opening paragraph of last year's update – as once again we take one step forward and two back. Actually, its more like we take one step over a hurdle and find it lands us with an even bigger hurdle to surmount.

By December 2011 we thought we were in a position to utilise grant funding from the General Trustees to employ an architect to draw up the necessary plans to move ahead.

We even had plans for a summer café as a pilot project to demonstrate how we see an upgraded building be more open to the community as well as more suitable for our own worship and social needs.

A timetable which was planned in January has however been revised three times so far, each time as new information causes us to reassess, as events beyond our control "move the goal posts" for us..

All this is hard work and taxing on the team who are putting in many hours work seeking to move the project forward and they need your support, patience and your prayers as work develops.

However, it is not all bad news, by the time you read this we will have had another new "let" of the hall established and an open evening on election day, so small steps towards our overall goal are being taken even if the giant leap forward has yet to materialise.

Message from the Manse

Once again May brings with it elections, the possibility of change in local government, and questions about the future and how we play our part in helping to shape it.

In the church, our Planning for the future shape of the Presbytery has become a more open listening to the views of congregations, and what emerges, whilst no doubt difficult to accept for some, at least will have been the digest of the hopes and aspirations of the many.

Yet no church or city or nation can be run by everyone voting on every issue, and if there is a current theme to the crises running through the whole fabric of our society it is that of a lack of trust and leadership, or at least a lack of trust in our leadership.

Do we trust those charged with running our country? Opinion polls suggest not very much, that politicians serve themselves and their group rather than the nation as a whole.

Do we trust those who "run" the church? Do we even know who "they" are? As the General Assembly meets this year with proposals for fewer to attend its deliberations in coming years, how are "views from the pews" heard by those who shape its thinking and policy making if there is no forum in which such views can be expressed?

Over the years the Assembly itself has changed a great deal, focusing as much on celebrating the national church's life as well as shaping its policies. Whilst this year's Assembly is likely to be the "quiet" one between two years of major reports on the Issue of Same Sex Relations, it will help promote the church nationally with a major event in Princes Street Gardens called "Heart and Soul", celebrating the life of the church across all its diversity in Scotland.

There were other plants; some colourful like dandelions and willow herb, some rank and unattractive, like mares' tails, brambles and docks.


Some of them invaded my chosen bed.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

Thank you for supporting the worship, mission and service of the Church through the money you give in your offering. It is important that you know what happens to this money. This letter tells you how your congregation's Ministries and Mission Contribution is used to enable the work of the Church.

Congregation:

Contribution

GLASGOW: POLLOKSHIELDS

£65.242

Ministries (86%)

£56,108

This provides over 1,000 ministers and other parish workers in communities throughout Scotland and in the Presbytery of England, and supports the costs of recruitment and training. The 2012 cost of a parish minister at the top of the stipend scale is £39,895 (stipend plus employer's national insurance and pension contributions).

Mission (14%)

£9.134

This supports the Church's work in resourcing congregations for Christian education and outreach, in caring for the most vulnerable in society, in partnership with Churches in some of the poorest parts of the world, and in providing a Christian perspective on the issues of today. It also provides financial, legal, safeguarding and other services for congregations and committees, and supports the cost of the General Assembly and the Moderator.

Please note that Ministries and Mission Contributions only provide part of the total funding required for the work of the Church listed above. A fuller picture is given in the leaflet *Ministries and Mission 2012*, which is available free to all congregations.

I hope that this helps you to understand Ministries and Mission Contributions and shows you are enabling the sharing of the gospel through the money your congregation sends through the Church Offices to all parts of Scotland and beyond.

Report from: The Way Youth Group

It has been a privilege to serve God in The Way over the past year and a half. The past two sessions have seen 31 different young people come to The Way with average numbers on any one night around 10. I have particularly enjoyed working together with up to 8 different leaders from different churches in Pollokshields. We have had great fun enjoying all the activities and special events which have proved to be popular with our members. Julian Guse has provided pizza, food and drink each time and this has been a fantastic way to socialise with the young people and discuss the Christian message in a relaxed format. The facilities in the Fotheringay Centre are also an excellent resource for us. Most of the topics we have covered have been in answers to the young people's own questions. I believe that as a result we have discussed what is relevant to them and shared what God's word has to say. It's our prayer that they will have been drawn closer to God as a consequence.

Some particular highlights for me personal have been to renew contact with two sets of brothers who came to faith through Scripture Union (SU) holidays but had stopped coming along to the weekly SU group. I was also touched by the twins saying that they had benefited and valued The Way & SU so much that they had decided to commit to always being there whenever they could, even when often they had been invited to other things. They have been

faithfully attending these groups for 4 years now. In the first year it was great to have 3 Asian girls along who I think heard about The Way through the Holiday Club.

My hope for the future is the PCT will appoint a youth worker who will be able to build upon these foundations.

The Guild


