Elsewhere in this magazine there is an article highlighting the decision of the General Assembly to allow the ordination of those in civil partnerships. What had seemed a motion looking to preserve the status quo, in fact in its detail, opens the way for the church to move forward in a more inclusive manner albeit slowly as legislation will take to 2015 to enact.

And whilst it may not be as bald and clear a step as the BBC news strap-line was suggesting on Monday night, it does recognise that the church must engage with the world not retreat from it.

One side issue to the debate on the Theological Commission's report was that of how Presbyteries voice their opinions and allowing a secret ballot is a major change. Perhaps the voice of the whole church's membership on such matters may yet be heard.

Hopefully too the bigger issues included in Church and Society, Mission and Discipleship, World Mission and Ministry Tenure Reports might also have the same kind of press interest and coverage as the Theological Commission has had. The church needs to be seen to promote itself and its good work so that the world might know the relevance of Jesus Christ to our lives and the life of our community and nation.

General Assembly of 2013: Theological Commission on Same Sex Relations and Ministry.

The press release following the decision of the Assembly reads:

The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in a groundbreaking decision called for the Church to maintain its historic doctrine in relation to human sexuality but, in line with the Kirk's historic position of allowing congregations to call their own minister, to permit an individual Kirk Session to call a minister in a civil partnership if it chooses to do so.

The wording of what was passed says inter alia:

3. (i). Affirm the Church's historic and current doctrine and practice in relation to human sexuality nonetheless permit those Kirk sessions who wish to depart from that doctrine and practice to do so.

(ii) Instruct the Legal Questions Committee to bring an Overture to the General Assembly of 2014 which the following principles of 3. (i) above:

Principles of the Overture:

- 1. Would not require the Church to abandon its traditional position.
- But would allow individual congregations by decisions of their Kirk Sessions – to depart from the Church's traditional position.

3. Would allow ministers and deacons (current and prospective) who are in civil partnerships to be selected for training and to be trained. Would also allow them to be ordained/inducted into a charge the Kirk Session of which had decided to depart from the Church's traditional position.

4. Would cover inducted ministers and ministers and deacons working in other roles in congregations.

5. Would not enable one congregation to depart from traditional position where others in a linking do not wish to do so.

6. Would enable a Kirk Session to change its mind. But a minister or deacon who had been appointed to a congregation whose Kirk Session had decided to depart from the traditional position would not be prejudiced by a change of mind by the Kirk Session.

7. Would preserve liberty of opinion and responsible expression. Would not permit harassing or bullying.

8. Preserves right of members of presbyteries – whatever views – to engage or not in ordinations/inductions.

iii) Instruct the Theological Forum to explore the relevant ecclesiological issues informing the principles of the "mixed economy" as set out in the Report of the Theological Commission and report to the General Assembly of 2014.

(iv) Instruct all Courts, Councils and Committees of the Church not to make decisions in accordance with section 3.(i) above until the position in relation to the proposed Overture has been finally determined by a future General Assembly.

Therefore although there is a shift in thinking towards what is being called a "mixed economy" situation, in fact nothing will change until new legislation is drafted and approved by Presbyteries which will take until 2015 to enact.

You could come to as much of the debate as you wished with many people coming and going throughout the day. Can I thank David for arranging this streaming as it was very helpful. Especially hearing other people's points of view and having David on hand to answer any questions you wished to ask.

Our Guest Organist on the evening will be Ian Hare read below some of Ian's performances:

Ian Hare has performed widely in Britain and abroad, including France, Germany, Holland, and the USA. He has played at many of the major London venues, notably Westminster Abbev, St. Paul's Cathedral; the Temple Church appeared at the BBC Proms. Performances in the past few years have also included engagements in Vienna and Berlin, and recitals at Queen's College, Oxford and King's College, Cambridge. He has made several broadcasts for radio and television, and organ CDs. Ian became a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists at the age of sixteen and studied in Paris with André Marchal. From 1968 to 1972 he was Organ Scholar of King's College, Cambridge, under the direction of Sir David Willcocks. Subsequently, following studies at the Royal College of Music and with Nadia Boulanger in France, he was appointed Lecturer in Music at Lancaster University in 1974, where he became the first University Organist, and in 2006 he was awarded an Honorary Fellowship.

DEMENTIA-FRIENDLY CHURCHES

Under the auspices of Cross-reach, a seminar on how we can better understand dementia and help our church to be more dementia-friendly was held in Perth last month. Irene McLeod and I attended this.

At the present time 84,000 people in Scotland are diagnosed as having dementia. Instead of looking at dementia from OUR point of view, we have to look at the person who is suffering from it and see how it affects THEIR life. Early diagnosis is important so that families are made aware of where to turn, and support from all available groups (including doctors, health clinics, family and friends) can be put in place. Hospital staff should be alerted so that if a patient is admitted for other reasons attention can be drawn to their dementia. After diagnosis, fifteen years of comparatively good quality of life can often be expected. Sometimes there is no need to hospitalise the sufferer until the very last stage, but until then there are lots of strategies that can be carried out.

For instance, we can help maintain the person's link with the church through pastoral visiting, by building good support networks via day care centres, or getting them to meet with friends for coffee, all of which diminish their isolation. Elaine Harley, who manages Alzheimer Scotland's 24 Hour Helpline, said: Take people out somewhere. Help them to continue as much of their previous lifestyle as possible. Going for walks helps to alleviate stress and overcome sleeping problems."

Encouraging the person to take up some activity like painting was another hint given by Paula Pinda; this helps to break down barriers of discrimination and the stigma which is often attached to people with dementia: all it requires is some acrylic paint and a sketch book!

A workshop on WORSHIP IN CARE HOMES was given by the Rev George McKay. He showed a film in which he demonstrated how, by taking time just to chat to a lady with no recognisable speech pattern, she was with love and perseverance enabled to respond to music and even to dance a little. Another lady, who was showing signs of stress, was helped by having her hands rubbed gently with hand cream (with her consent, of course).

The PASTORAL VISIT WORKSHOP given by Pamela Mackay, who has nursing experience and a Postgraduate Certificate in Dementia Studies, gave us helpful hints in handling what can be quite a difficult visit. For instance, our first greeting is often, "How are you?" and "What have you been doing since I last saw you?" But this should be avoided, because the person's short term memory is a problem and such questions may cause stress. Something like, "You wouldn't believe how busy the traffic is today," is safer. If the person's husband / wife is deceased and you are asked, "Why hasn't he / she come to visit me?" turn the conversation around by asking, for example, "Wasn't he a teacher?" etc., thus diverting them from their worry. Hallucinations can be quite tricky, because the person seeing them is quite convinced that the people or things they see are really there. One visitor found her friend suffering great anxiety because she believed she saw twenty policemen standing outside her window. Here the stress-avoiding tactic might be to say, "Don't you think the police have very difficult jobs?" or, "Don't you think that policemen are getting younger these days?", which might even get them laughing again! Taking one's leave can often be difficult, and a quite positive approach might be, "Well, I've really enjoyed our talk today, may I come again?", thus avoiding the mistake of saying, "Well, I must be going because I've got to meet someone, etc." which can make the person feel of less importance.

SUPPORTING FAMILY CARERS was led by Shirley Law, of Stirling University's Dementia Service, who spoke of the need of family carers to find support within the community, perhaps by neighbours and friends offering to sit with the person or by taking them out for walks, so that the carer may be able to have some recreational time on their own.

The speakers were excellent and gave us far more than I have been able to tell here. All in all Irene and I found it a very interesting and helpful experience.

Scotland's Pilgrim Journey



Scotland's Churches Trust's exciting project which creates and initial six pilgrim routes across Scotland was launched recently by Scottish Government Minister: Roseanna Cunningham and is now fully accessible on the new website www.scotlandspilgrimjourneys.com

The project, which has the support of Scottish Enterprise (with a Tourism Innovation Award), Historic Scotland and VisitScotland, bring together the ancient routes of Scotland's Celtic saints and medieval traditions of pilgrimage with modern faith journeys. The routes can be followed by road transport, by bicycle and by walking were paths are

available. Each journey is divided into stages which can be explored as time and choice allow. The stages have interpretative themes and can be followed in either direction.

Many of our member churches, together with other sacred sites are featured and we are presently arranging for some of these churches to be 'destination hubs' where information can be found and 'passports' stamped! The website has full details and links to our SCT website with and the information about the specific churches the pilgrims might with to visit.

Celebrity Organ Recital

Our 2nd Celebrity Organ Recital will be held in the Church on Friday 27th September at 7:00pm.

Our Guest Organist on the evening will be John Scott Whiteley read below some of John's musical journey:

John Scott Whiteley is Organist Emeritus of York Minster, having worked at that great cathedral from 1975 until 2010 when he retired from the Minster in order to pursue his freelance career. During the past ten years he has become well-known for his performances on BBC2 and BBC4 television of the complete organ music of Johann Sebastian Bach. 21st-Century Bach was ioint а commission by BBC2 and BBC4 and began in 2001. The series continues and is planned to run for several more years, after which time some eighty programmers will have covered Bach's entire output for organ. The series described British dailv by the national was newspaper, The Daily Telegraph, as "a triumph both nationally and musically." Having studied at the Royal College of Music with Ralph Downes and W.S. Lloyd Webber, and with Flor Peeters in Malines and Fernando Germani in Siena, John Scott Whiteley won first prize in the 1976 National Organ Competition of Great Britain. He then performed at the Royal Festival Hall, and at festivals throughout Europe. The most recent of these have included the 2005 International Organ Festival in St. Albans, the 2006 Musicometa Festival in Rome, and the 2008 Bach Festivals in Skiernewice, Poland. and Camaiore, Italy. Since 1985 John has toured the USA annually.


Despite the dreich weather, spirits were uplifted by a range of free events which culminated in a moving and devout outdoor worship which featured the Iona band.
