Gift Day - A Great Success Despite The Weather

In spite of the fierce physical cold and the frostiness of the financial climate our Gift Day was a heart-warming success.

Sixty members of the congregation either made it through the snow or gave in or sent their special donations to raise a great total of £9,685.

Of that sum £8,835 was Gift Aided, which means with the reclaimed tax the total, will rise to £11,326.92. Adding in the non-Gift Aided donations of £850 the total will then be £12,176.92.

That really is a great achievement which should give us all a warm glow despite the weather.

We are however not finished there. We know of a number of members who just could not make it through the adverse weather but had set aside their donation to hand in as this edition of the New Vision went to press.

I would urge all of you who are still to give to Gift Aid the special donation and indeed your regular giving to the Church. Anyone who wants to know more about that should speak to David Hart.

Tithing our time, our talents, our energy and our money is important as a sign and as an expression of our commitment to each other, to the Church and to our Lord.

Those of us who were able to be there on Sunday stood to express that commitment verbally in rededicating ourselves to the Church and its work.

It was good that so many who were there on Sunday morning were able to stay on and enjoy lunch in the hall. Thanks to all who made and serve the lunch and to the finance group for counting the special donations.

Shoogaling the Kaleidoscope

We had a lecture in the Cathedral by the Right Rev Dr Richard Holloway, the Bishop of Edinburgh on the state of religion today. Dr Holloway is one of the people whom you either approve of or you don't. In the lecture he divided religious people into four categories.

Those in the first category he called Strongly Religious. We would probably call them Fundamentalists. They are people who believe implicitly what is in the book, the book having been written thousands of years ago, when society was completely different. His opinion was that this might be ok for some because it gives people great comfort and complete certainty. But, if something turns up that does not fit into this system, the whole thing collapses and people lose faith.

The second category he calls the Weakly Religious. We would call them Liberal. Their beliefs are flexible, and anything new can be made to fit in. The trouble is we are not sure what the Liberals believe. We think they might believe anything or nothing.

The third category is those who don't believe anything very much, but enjoy singing familiar hymn tunes and find comfort in the old language. They are very conservative and will resist any change at all. The trouble is that time will pass them by.

The fourth category is the most controversial. They are the unbelievers. They can be divided into two groups. The first is those who do not believe anything. Religious means nothing to them. It is as if they were tone deaf to music or colour blind to paintings.

The other group in the category are very religious. They believe that all religion is false, and they are very evangelical about this. They believe there is no God, and they can prove it.

They get very annoyed if you question their theory. They try to convert everyone to their perverted religion.

And so you see, looking at religion in modern society is like looking through a shoogly kaleidoscope. It is always changing. By the way, I am not sure which category I fit into.

Little People who have made a big Impression The Little Maid

The Bible is often short on detail. We Are told nothing about the young Israeli girl taken captive by a band of raiders from Syria.

What was her name? How old was she? Had she any brothers or sisters? What happened to her Mum and Dad? We do not know, but we can imagine her terror, despair and misery when she was taken from everything that was familiar and sold in a strange country as a slave girl.

Her new mistress, she discovered, was the wife of Namaan, the commander of the Syrian army. Namaan was a leper, but in that country the illness carried no stigma of uncleanness or ostracism as in Israel. Nevertheless the young girl would have been brought up to regard the disease as abhorrent, and Namaan's condition would have added to her misery.

Fortunately, if we read between the lines, Namaan's wife was good and kind, for there arose between the young slave girl and her mistress trust and even love. She eventually plucked up courage and said, "If only my master would see the prophet who is in Samaria he would cure him."

The story of how Namaan was healed, and what then happened to Elisha's greedy and deceitful servant, is written in 2 Kings Chapter 5.

And the girl? Nothing further; she was just one of the 'little people'. All we know is the he kindly concern for her master and her faith in God made such an impression on the writer of the Book of Kings that she is still remembered thousands of years later.

Worship and Hymns

When the school children come on a visit to our church one of the questions that the children ask is why we sing hymns during our worship. An article appears in the December Life and Work in which Douglas Galbraith gives his view on this subject.

He explains that he reread his first article that he wrote for Life and Work which was called 'Death by hymn sandwich'. A term so often used to describe present day Presbyterians at prayer. After the title he feels that he did not actually explain or discussed this much maligned lunch delicacy.


He thinks there is nothing wrong with five hymns and four fillings? He goes on to say that hymns are treated as set pieces, little acts of worships in themselves. Music, however, is no mere embellishment of word and ritual. If music is embedded in the liturgy, it is also embedded in the worshippers, in that to make music demands physical investment, both in body and brain, even when we are 'only' listening. As we sing, we are 'made into church', grow as disciples.

So when a hymn bursts out of wrestling in prayer, or a new grasp of a biblical truth, or a sense of awe in the building, or joy in being with our fellow pilgrims: and when it leaves an aftertaste that is only expressible in a hunger for scripture, or the call to the table, or the longing for the spirit to descend, then that is no longer a hymn sandwich. Worship, hymns, music are one. So if it is not sandwich, what? Let call it, the whole act of worship-yes a hymn soufflé.
