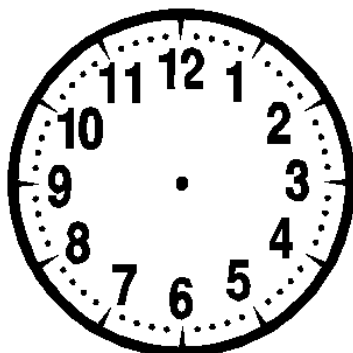

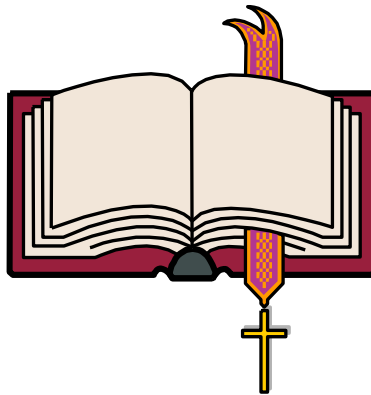

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I write to thank you most sincerely for supporting the worship, mission and service of the Church through the money you give in your offerings. It is important that you should know what happens to this money and this letter (along with the enclosed Ministries and Mission leaflet) intends to explain how your congregation's Ministries and Mission Contribution will be used to enable the work of the Church in 2014.

Total Contribution to Ministries and Mission for 2014

£58,546



Ministries (86%)

£50,350 of your total contribution will go towards the costs of providing over 1,000 ministers and other parish workers in communities throughout Scotland and in the Presbytery of England. This contribution also assists with the costs of recruitment and training.

The 2014 cost of a parish minister at the top of the stipend scale is **£40,411** (stipend plus employer's national insurance and pension contributions). If your contribution to Ministries is above this figure, then your church is meeting the full cost of your ministry and supporting other congregations. If it is less than £40,411, your congregation (or linked charge) is being supported by other congregations.



Mission (14%)

£8,196 of your total contribution will be used to support the Church's work in: resourcing congregations for Christian education and outreach; providing social care services in Christ's name to further the caring work of the Church to people in need; accompanying partners around the world on our shared Christian journey; contributing the Church's opinion in public debate and on issues affecting Scotland and the World; providing central day-to-day service work in administrative, financial and legal matters; and in planning the General Assembly and ensuring the Moderator represents the Church.

For all the Saints

I have always thought that the story of how Christianity came to Scotland is of great interest and indeed of great importance. The message was brought to us by men who suffered incredible hardship and danger. These Celtic missionaries were truly Saints. They are shadowy figures. We do not know much about them and some of their stories are a bit suspect.

Recently I have become aware of one. Back in 1960 a crannog was excavated at Loch Glashan, a small loch in the hills behind Loch Fyne. The crannog was a lake dwelling and most of what remains had been submerged in the water. As a result, archaeologists found things preserved, which would normally have decayed and disappeared.

At the time, when I heard of the excavation, I took a run up to Loch Glashan to have a look. When I got there the excavation was complete and there was not much to see.

After an excavation, there is always tremendous amount of work to be done. The finds have got to be cleaned, examined and preserved. The most Interesting items were a number of pieces of leather. The excavator had assumed that they were from a leather jacket and for 40years this was assumed to be the case.

Recently, a sharp eyed curator at the museum spotted from the stitching, that it could not be a jacket. On further investigation, it was proved that the leather fragments were part of a leather bag or satchel.

A quality leather satchel was an unlikely thing for a farmer to possess. So, whose was it, and what was it for? The mostly likely suggestion is that was was made for and used by a priest, or missionary to carry a sacred book or bible. We know that they, travelled by foot far and wide, over hills and through bogs, and that they carried their precious books with them in bags.

I like to think that here we have a genuine relic of the coming of Christianity. The original leather satchel is now exhibited in the Kelvingrove Art Galleries with a full and detailed description of it and the other finds from Loch Glashan.

The Story Behind the Hymn He Lives, He Lives!

This rousing hymn was written in 1933 by a Presbyterian minister called Alfred Henry Ackley.

Alfred Ackley, born in Pennsylvania in 1887, was an accomplished musician and wrote in excess of 1500 hymns, although his brother Bentley wrote more than 3000! Two prolific hymn writers.

It was while preaching at an evangelistic meeting, that Rev Ackley was approached by a young Jewish student who challenged him to explain why he should worship "a dead Jew". Ackley's immediate, emphatic reply was to say, *"He Lives, I tell you, He is not dead but He lives here and now. I tell you, Jesus Christ is more alive today than ever before and I can prove this by my own experience as well as the testimonies of thousands"*.

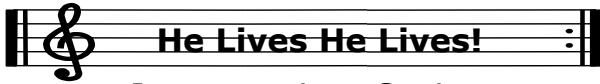
The young Jewish scholar was impressed by this response and eventually accepted the living Christ as his Saviour.

Affected by this encounter, Rev Ackley went home and re-read passages from the Bible about Jesus' death and resurrection, particularly the promise of Acts 13 v 32-33. Suddenly the words, *'He is risen'* took on a new meaning and he decided to put his thoughts and feelings to music... the end result being this lovely hymn.

This triumphant message which is a proclamation of faith for every Christian, is also an answer to those who scoff!

Moderator-Designate

The Church of Scotland today expresses great regret that the Rev Dr Angus Morrison has health issues and, following medical advice, has had to withdraw from the position of Moderator-Designate for the 2014 General Assembly.

He is undergoing treatment and it is hoped that over the remainder of this year his health will be fully restored. In the meantime his well-being depends on having time and space to fully recover.

Rev Dr Morrison, Minister of Orwell and Portmoak Church in the Presbytery of Perth, said: "This has been a very painful decision but deep down I feel it is the right one. I am undergoing medical treatment and anticipate an operation ahead. The demanding role of Moderator requires someone to be operating on all cylinders. I do not have the necessary reserves just now.

"It is with huge regret and reluctance that I make this decision. My heartfelt prayers will be with all those on whom unexpected burdens now fall. May God's guidance, strength and peace be given to each one.

" The Rev John Chalmers, Principal Clerk for the Church of Scotland, said: "We ask the whole Church to remember Angus and his family in their prayers and we hope that his health is fully restored in due course. I know that the General Assembly will be enormously sympathetic to Angus's position and will no doubt want

him to fulfil the role of Moderator at some time in the future when he has made a full recovery.”

The Committee to Nominate the Moderator will be recalled in order to bring forward the name of another nominee. There is no precedent in living memory for a Moderator-Designate standing down. The Committee, which is drawn from across the Presbyteries of the Church of Scotland, has wide ranging powers to act in the event of such unforeseen circumstances. The name of the new Moderator-Designate is likely to be announced on Wednesday 2nd April.

Rev Dr Morrison was born in Glencoe in 1953. As his father worked for the Northern Lighthouse Service, the young Angus went to school in Oban, Stromness and Edinburgh before progressing to higher education at the University of Glasgow. He undertook further studies at Pisa University and London University before a PhD at Edinburgh University (New College).

Rev Dr Morrison's church career began when he was ordained in the Free Presbyterian Church of Scotland in 1979, but after ministries in Oban and Edinburgh, he transferred into the Church of Scotland, became the minister of St Columba's Old Parish Church in Stornoway and is now Minister at Orwell and Portmoak Parish Church. Rev Dr Morrison, who has a degree in Classics and speaks Italian and Gaelic, is married to Marion who is a primary school teacher in Fife. The couple have four children between the ages of 16 and 27.

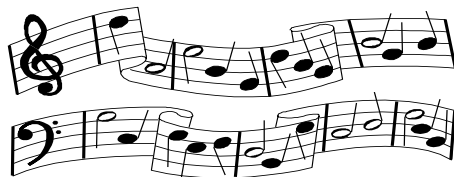

An update of Bookworms:

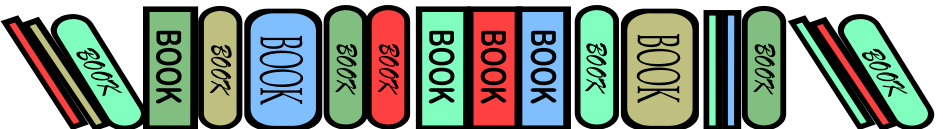

Lent - a season for making changes

The season of Lent is part of the Church Calendar for focusing our worship in a particular way. It lasts for approximately for six weeks and leads up to Easter. It is practiced in different ways throughout Christianity but the intention of such a season is captured by Rev. Roddy Hamilton, the minister of Bearsden: New Kilpatrick, when he says in the Starters for Sunday worship resource, "Lent ... is the unique opportunity to enter a short season where we might be able to responding in a new way to the world."

He continues, "Many psychologists suggest 6 weeks is the ideal length of time to break a habit and pick up a new one. It is as if God invented Lent specifically to give ourselves the perfect chance of renewal and transformation."

One habit that we can pick up is to pray for the transformation of our fragile world whether that is the political unrest and tensions in the Ukraine or the uncertainty over the future of Syria. Prayer is a teachable habit expressed in the humble request of Jesus' first followers: "Teach us to pray". Prayer, when practiced regularly as a habit, helps us reflect and consider the needs of others. It helps us to be in that place to listen and respond to others. May our prayer be that government leaders will also be in that place to respond to the needs of others.

There are plenty of resources available other than Starters for Sunday that help us consider others during the season of Lent. If you are looking for a study
